

Wind Harp Installation Between the Crevice and Grass Gardens

Thanks to the Creative Economy Commission and the Arts & Culture Funding from the 2022 Lodger's Tax, the Durango Botanic Gardens has received a substantial grant to purchase a worldclass piece of metal art. We applied for and received funds to purchase the Infiniti Wind Harp II, created by Ross Barrable of Harmony Wind Harps, in nearby Pagosa. This fascinating piece of art combines design with musicality. The stunning work in metal features 18 nylon strings and stainless-steel tuning pins that will capture wind movements in the Animas River Corridor and transform them into a variety of natural, pleasing musical tones.

Docents Choose Their Plants of the Year (s)

Melanie Palmer, curator of the Durango Botanic Gardens conducted a survey of our docents to choose the plant of the year for 2021 and 2022. Here is her report on our Docents' Plant of the Year. For 2021, the docents chose a perennial grass, Undaunted Ruby Muhly, Muhlenbergia reverchonii 'PUND01S', which has been a star in the Dryland Mesa section of the Demonstration Garden for years and is now lighting up the Elevation Grass Collection.

The Docents' Choice for 2022 is the 'Midnight Marvel' Rose Mallow, a hardy hibiscus that is in its third season. Slow to leaf out in the spring, it makes up for lost time in late summer when it is covered with deep red blooms.

River of Pages in the Literary Garden

Look for an interesting art installation in the Contemporary Section of the Literary Garden. The "River of Pages" is Durango artist Mary Ellen Long's homage to authors and poets who write about nature and the environment. Each "page," once a book, has weathered a decade of rain, snow, sun and wind. The pages flow into her open book, a sculptural collage of plant fiber papers embellished with forest findings. Mary Ellen uses time and nature to "evolve" her art on paper and the art of paper. This is a temporary installation that will be replaced by a permanent installation in the spring with flagstones inscribed with the names of well-known nature writers.
