We've Met Our Match for the Literary Garden!

Thanks to over 100 donors, initial construction of the Literary Garden will begin in August. The full build-out of this major addition to our gardens may not be complete until 2023 but we are well on the way! We believe this exciting project will further position the Durango Botanic Gardens as a popular destination for area residents and visitors alike.

In May a Durango couple offered us \$25,000 if we could raise a corresponding \$25,000 by July 13, 2021. With the help of over 100 individual donors, we actually hit that mark and exceeded it well before that deadline. Another \$15,000 is being added by the city of Durango and we are receiving \$4,000 from the Friends of the Library. We are appreciate all of you who donated to this new garden.

We are, however, not finished. The Literary Garden effort will eventually cost closer to \$125,000 and will most likely be a two-year effort as we search for and find the proper plants, which can be limited by availability and pricing.

That means we are still in fund-raising mode and still seeking donations. We are so close!

DBG Mural Completed and Dedicated

Our new mural, now gracing what was formerly a muddy brown parking lot retaining wall between the library and the Riverside Professional Building, was formally dedicated at an event on July 15, hosted by the Durango Creative District and the Durango Botanic Gardens.

The botanically-themed mural, painted by Nia Sturr, depicts plants and flowers common to our region's biological life zones. To reflect the amazing diversity, plants common to lower, dryland mesas begin at the left of the mural and ascend to plants, trees, and flowers common to higher, montane and alpine elevations.
